2nd Grade Writing Lesson: April 16, 2020

Learning Target: I can organize my sentences in a way that makes sense.


Background: This is a continuation lesson from this week.

- Students learn to provide some sense of closure in 1st grade.
- Students learn to follow a writing process by planning a first draft by brainstorming and recording key ideas in 1st grade.
- Students follow a logical sequence of events using complete sentences to create a beginning/middle/end in 2nd grade.



<u>Cliffhanger:</u> Although I had a great time, nothing could have prepared me for what happened next...

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
