#### 3rd Grade Art Lesson: Invented Texture

<u>Texture</u> is the surface quality of an object. The way something feels or how it looks like it would feel.

# Actual Texture: Texture or surface quality you can see and feel through touch.

- Use your sense of touch to feel the texture of your: Hair....face....shirt....bottom of your shoes, other things nearby.
- Think of three words to describe the way actual textures might feel: (soft, smooth...)



# Practice #1: Make a crayon rubbing of actual textures around your house.

- Place a sheet of paper over the textured item
- Use a stubby dark colored crayon with no wrapper (or a sharp pencil laid on the side of the lead)
- Lay the crayon down and rub back and forth across the paper











<u>Invented Texture:</u> Texture or surface quality not intended to resemble textures found in real life.

Notice how the drawing of the bear below *doesn't* look like the actual texture of a bear's fur.



Artists use repetition of lines, shapes colors and values to create invented textures.




## Practice #2:Compare these two pictures by the artist Albrecht Durer.








#### Practice #3: Making Invented Textures



1. On a small paper (half sheet), draw two vertical and two horizontal lines to create 9 sections



2. Start by repeating a simple line or shape in one section. Choose a different line or shape in each section.



Add another line or shape in each section.



 Add more or different lines or shapes to finish each section.

Strive to create different lines and shapes in each section.

How does a texture change when you... change the length, direction, or curve of a line?

...put shapes in a grid versus randomly scattering them? ...change the size or spacing of lines and shapes?

# Practice #4: Create your own picture and fill the spaces with invented texture.

- Draw a picture with any supplies on hand (Pencil, pen, marker, colored pencil or crayon)
- Fill each area with a different invented texture
