### Learn

#### THEME:

A story has a **theme**, a message about life, the moral, and/or what was learned in the story. Sometimes the theme is **stated**, as when an author writes, "His experience showed that laughter is the best medicine." Often, however, the theme is **implied**. You must figure it out yourself.

To figure out the implied themes in a passage, think about the following:

- Are there any changes in the characters?
- Did the character learn anything?

#### **Reading Strategy:**

It's not always possible to figure out an implied theme in a single step. You have to build an understanding of the theme by **making inferences**--reaching conclusions based on evidence. Such evidence may include unusual events, as well as characters' words, actions, and reactions.



# Learn (continued)

A theme is BIGGER than the story and applicable to more than just the story

A theme is not a word, it is a sentence.

You don't have to agree with the theme to identify it.


#### Some examples of a theme could be:

Money can't buy happiness.

Don't judge people based on the surface.

Love conquers all.

Persistence pays off.





# Learn (continued)

### How to identify theme

What is the conflict (problem)?

What is the resolution of the conflict? (What does the character learn?)

What message can the reader take from the story?

What examples from the text may I use to support the theme?
