#### **Objectives/Learning Targets:**

#### Students will:

- focus on how to take notes when researching a topic.
- write responses using complete sentences with standard spelling, punctuation, and grammar.



# Warm-up

On a blank sheet of paper, write down important pieces of information that you think would help you in writing a paper about this activist. Write down things you think would be important for others to know about your subject.





# Warm-up Answers

What sort of things did you write down? What stood out to you?

Sample Proficient Answer: (Answers may vary)

Students should select information that reveals who Malala is, what she experienced and what she is fighting (standing up) for.




The next slides will walk you through the steps you can take to effectively take notes on a topic.



This is where you write the topic you are taking notes on.

## Step One

Set up a piece of notebook paper with two columns for note-taking.





# Step Two

## Remember, when taking notes about a topic you must...

- Write fast!
- Record important facts (exact names, places, numbers)
- Capture quotes and, if possible, the context
- Note what is said AND what you see
- Record your ideas as well as information



## Step Three

 Organize your notes through the natural process of putting similar information together.

#### Organizing notes...

- No more than 5 bits of info; when you have more, you should organize.
- Example: Chunking will help you to categorize the information that you are learning. For instance, you have gathered 5 pieces about Malala's cause, so you could chunk them together under the category of what Malala was fighting for.



# **Practice**

 Now, it is time to practice organizing our notes through the natural process of putting similar information together. Take notes on the video below and see what important information you can come up with.

#### Organizing notes...

- No more than 5 bits of info; when you have more, you should organize.
- Example: Chunking information will help you to categorize the information that you are learning.



#### Power-Learning and Note-Taking

- Write fast!
- Record important facts (<u>exact</u> names, places, numbers).
- Capture quotes and, if possible, the context in which they were said.
- Note what is <u>said</u> and what you <u>see</u>.
- Record your ideas as well as information.



# Practice Answer Key

- What happened to Malala?
  - Pakistani 16-year-old targeted by Taliban-shot-but still alive
  - 2 gunmen shot her when she was on way home from school
    - (in an open air bus that looks like a truck, w/benches)
  - Bullet went into her head, missed brain
  - Refused to die
- What Malala is fighting for
  - "I want every girl, every child, to be educated."
  - Fighting for the rights of others all over the world
  - For 31 million girls who don't have a voice
- What makes her special?
  - Became a symbol
  - She started a movement people chanting, writing, marching
  - Even though she was targeted, she continues to do it
