

Possible Notes

Located: between Colon and Balboa

Like Stairs: A ship enter the lock. Water fills the chamber and raises the boat to the next lock. There are three steps up.

Changed Global Shipping: Prior to the canal, ships had to travel around Cape Horn, Africa or around the tip of South America.

Obstacles overcome: owned by Columbia so U.S. back Panama's war for independence, Malaria and Yellow fever so mosquito netting and insecticides were used

Possible Notes

- 20 of every 100 people died from disease
- 20,000 lives lost under French construction,
- discrimination between white workers (gold workers) and black (silver worker)
- silver workers almost like slaves
- silver workers got diseases at a higher rate
- Deforestation
- Erosion

- Panamanians lose homes








Now let's fill in the graphic organizer.

- 1. Decide if you think that building the Panama Canal was good or bad. Write that in the circle labeled "Your Position."
- 2. Choose two things from either your positive impacts list or your negative impacts list and write them in the rectangle labeled "Your Reason."
- 3. Find a fact from your notes that supports one of your reasons and write it in the box labeled "Supporting Fact 1."
- 4. In the box labeled "Source", write who made the video that your fact came from.
- 5. Repeat steps 3 and 4 for your second reason and write them in the boxes labeled 2





Now, use your graphic organizer to guide your writing. Turn the notes you wrote in each space into your own original sentences. The structure of the paragraph should be "Your Position", "Your Reason", "Supporting Fact 1" and "Source", then "Supporting Fact 2" and "Source".

Following this format will enable you to easily answer questions that ask to you analyze, judge, or pick a side. You can expand this basic format from a simple short answer paragraph into a five paragraph essay by adding a third reason/supporting fact/source, and a conclusion.

Example Short Answer

Building the Panama Canal was a bad thing. It promoted racism and it was harmful to the environment. Katherine Giroux's video explains how workers were divided by race into gold workers and silver workers. The silver workers were treated almost like slaves. Colleen Maloney's video showed the impact of deforestation, erosion, and pollution on the environment in Panama.
