Today we are going to be reading about two opposite forces: fire and ice. On a piece of paper or google doc list three sets of opposing forces:



Robert Frost wrote both rhyming and free verse (does not rhyme) poetry. He spent time on both the east and west coasts of the USA, much of his poetry was written when he lived in New England. He taught high school and at the college level, earning multiple honorary degrees at several prestigious universities.

Fire and Ice by Robert Frost

Some say the world will end in fire,

Some say in ice.

From what I've tasted of desire How can a person "taste desire"? What does this mean?

I hold with those who favor fire. If he "holds favor" with someone, what does that mean?

But if it had to perish twice,

I think I know enough of hate How is hate similar to ice?

To say that for destruction ice

Is also great How can ice destroy someone or something?

And would suffice. What does he mean that it "would suffice"?

Practice continued:

How is hate similar to ice?

that mean?

How can ice destroy someone or something?

What does he mean that it "would suffice"?

Ice can destroy something by breaking it apart or making it worthless/unusable.

Suffice means it will be enough or adequate.

In this section of the poem he is talking about wanting something so badly that you crave it or "burn" for it.

If you hold favor with someone, it means you agree with them.

Hate and ice are similar because they can both "freeze" someone or something out of your life.



Practice Answer Key

(Answers will Vary)

- Check your answers to make sure it meets the following criteria:

Sample Proficient Answer:

- 1.) The main theme in "Fire and Ice" is destruction. Frost states that "I hold with those who favor fire" indicating that he believes fire is a better way to destroy something. He goes on to state that if you have another choice, ice is the next best way, "To say that for destruction ice, Is also great, And would suffice." Fire can completely destroy something it will be unrecognizable or totally destroyed. Ice may leave the object whole, but it is permanently damaged -there is no coming back.
- 2.) Death is the main theme in Frost's "Fire and Ice". While it is unclear if he is writing about the Earth, an object, or a relationship, it is clear that he thinks fire has a direct relationship with desire to burn up for something ("From what I've tasted of desire, I hold with those who favor fire"). Frost's second choice is ice to freeze someone or something out of your life. That person may be there, but they have no use to you (I think I know enough of hate, To say that for destruction ice, Is also great, And would suffice).
