Acknowledge new information expressed by others including those presented in diverse media and, when warranted, modify their own views.






Learn:

Today we are focusing on speaking and listening skills. When you are listening to an audio speech, focus on the speaker's point-of-view, their reasons behind their point-of-view and supporting thoughts as you take notes. You may take notes in whatever way you feel comfortable. Remember, in school, we frequently use Cornell

notes (see photo).



You may also use sketchnotes (see photo).



Practice Answer Key:

 - → Did you support and explain your answer using details from the article

Sample Proficient Answers:

- 1.) Rita Pierson defines "Mama Law" as the most important rules children learn at home. Whatever "Mama" says overrules all other laws/rules the child will encounter. If "Mama" says it is ok to do something it is ok; if "Mama" says no there will be harsh consequences otherwise. Students need a separate set of rules/laws at home and school because schools need to help support parental values and build upon them, not tear them down or tell parents their rules are wrong.
- 2.) "Mama Law" is the most important rule set a student will ever have. Whatever "Mama" says will overrule school or public laws. Some families have two sets of rules one for school and one for home. Schools need to respect the home rules and build on them, not tell families to change what is already working for them.


