

African Americans played major parts for both sides during the war. In the North they were soldiers on the battlefield fighting alongside other northern soldiers. In the South African American slaves were forced to help create weapons and other technology. Later in the war they were also forced to fight in the war itself.

2. Not during the entire war. In the beginning most African Americans were not allowed to be soldiers because Lincoln and other officials believed this may cause the border states to switch sides. Eventually African Americans were mostly free to join the North and formed there owned regiments totalling about 180,00 soldiers.

Lesson Activity- Answer Key

- 1. When were freed African American men able to enlist in the army? Why? African Americans were able to list in 1862, following the passage of the Second Confiscation and Militia Act, which freed slaves who had masters in the Confederate Army, and Lincoln's signing of the Emancipation Proclamation.
- 2. In what ways were African Americans still discriminated against? Why did they continue to enlist?.
 - African Americans were paid much less than white soldiers. African American soldiers would also be treated much more harshly if captured by the Confederate Army.
- 3. By the end of the war, about how many African Americans had enlisted? About 180.000 soldiers enlisted in the Civil War.
- 4. What other roles did African Americans play in the Civil War? Blacks on both sides of the war served in relief roles, for example, working as nurses, cooks, and blacksmiths. Freed blacks, including Harriet Tubman, were also spies, scouts, and agents.
