WARM UP

1. What do you think women during the Civil War were responsible for while their husbands or significant others were fighting in the war?

What your teacher was thinking: Women helped to care for the soldiers while they were camped and preparing for battle. They sewed uniforms, provided blankets, mended shoes, washed clothes, and cooked for the soldiers. Perhaps the most important role women played during the war was providing medical care for sick and wounded soldiers.

2. What do you think children were responsible for doing during the Civil War?

What your teacher was thinking: Kids helped run family farms and businesses. They planted and harvested crops, chopped wood, and butchered animals for food. They drove horses, cooked, and cared for siblings.
