# **Objective/Learning Target:**

I can quote, paraphrase, and summarize text without plagiarising.

# WARM UP

Let's see what you know about quotations, paraphrasing, and summarizing. Below is one quotation, one example of paraphrasing, and one summary. Try and match them correctly.


"The Hunger Games" book series is about a girl who leads a rebellion against a dictator.

In research papers, students often quote excessively, failing to keep quoted material down to a desirable level. Since the problem usually originates during note taking, it is essential to minimize the material recorded verbatim (Lester 46-47).

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# **LEARN**

**Quoting** is a sentence or passage taken directly from a source. You do not change anything. To identify a quote, you place quotation marks around the selected passage. You will always cite who said the quote, usually by introducing who said it (see the example on the previous slide.

**Paraphrasing** is used to show that you understand what the author wrote. You must completely re-word the passage using your own words. Changing a few words here and there isn't considered paraphrasing. You will always cite the author since you are re-wording his/her ideas.

**Summarizing** is an overview of what the text is about. This is the main idea of the text.

# **LEARNING** continued

#### 6 Steps to Effective Paraphrasing Without Plagiarising

- 1. Reread the original passage until you understand its full meaning.
- 2. Set the original aside, and write your paraphrase on a note card.



- 3. Jot down a few words below your paraphrase to remind you later how you envision using this material. At the top of the note card, write a key word or phrase to indicate the subject of your paraphrase.
- 4. Check what you wrote with the original to make sure that your version accurately expresses all the essential information in a new form.
- 5. Use quotation marks to identify any unique term or phrases you have borrowed exactly from the source.
- 6. Cite the author of the original passage after your paraphrasing. For example, if you are paraphrasing a passage on page 15 of John Smith's book, you would end your paraphrase with (Smith 15). Notice the example on slide 4.
