How can you use PBIS at home?

PBIS can easily be adapted for use at home. Young Children thrive in a setting where an adult in charge and expectations are clear, consistent, and positively stated in short phrases.

To use PBIS in your home:

Decide on 2 or 3 overall expectations.

Use the expectations we have at school or choose your own (such as Take

Care of Your Toys or Take Care of

Your Room).

Teach them.

Model them.

Practice them.

Review them often.

Use simple, short positive phrases to help them understand appropriate behaviors.

An example instead of saying ,"Don't Run", use "Walking Feet.: When you say Don't Run the child hears the word Run. What can you do to help your child/ren stay on the path to positive behavior?

Review the School Wide Positive Behavior Expectations Matrix

Use Positive, Short Concise Phrases

Use 4 to 1 positive statements to create a positive environment at home and to help the child/ren generalize across settings.

What is Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports?

(PBIS)

Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports is a process for creating school environments that are predictable and effective for achieving academic and social goals.

PBIS is an approach to discipline that:

*defines appropriate behavior that is expected

*teaches expected behavior

*reinforces appropriate behavior when it occurs.

The goal of PBIS is to provide and maintain a safe learning environment for our students and teach them social expectations they will need in the future.

*This is a district wide initiative and is implemented in the ISD Schools K-12.

Hanthorn Early Education Staff are teaching the same three behavior expectations:

Bee Safe

Bee Kind

Bee Responsible

We don't assume that children know how to behave in a "school way" when they begin school at Hanthorn. We teach these skills to everyone!

Social Skills are just like pre-academic skills they must be taught. Everyone teaches the children what appropriate behavior looks like throughout the day.

Adults model the behavior for the children, given the opportunity to practice the behaviors and point out when children are being safe, being kind, and being responsible.
