# AP Language & Composition Lesson: April 21, 2020

#### **Objectives**:

- 1) Identify and describe the claims and evidence of an argument.
- 2) Analyze evidence writers use to support a claim.
- 3) Develop writing that includes a claim and evidence supporting that claim.

#### Before you begin - continued

- If you were writing an argument and truly trying to convince someone of your perspective, would it be beneficial to include the point you mentioned above and admit the opposing side has a valid point? Would doing so hurt your own argument?
  - Acknowledging that people who disagree with you still have some valid points presents you as being more open-minded and knowledgeable, which in turn establishes your credibility (ethos).
    - Open-minded because you don't think you are 100% correct
    - Knowledgeable because you understand both sides of the argument
