Objectives:

- 1. Develop writing that includes a claim and evidence supporting the claim.
- 2. Qualify a claim using modifiers, counterarguments, or alternative perspectives.
- 3. Strategically use words, comparisons, and syntax to convey a specific tone or style in an argument.
- 4. Use established conventions of grammar and mechanics to communicate clearly and effectively.

Today's Lesson

On <u>Monday and Tuesday</u> you read and analyzed President Kennedy's speech about space exploration and sending a man to the moon. <u>Yesterday</u> you read and completed the assignment handout in response to a prompt that relates to the speech, specifically the idea of the unknown.

<u>Today</u> you will use your assignment handout you completed yesterday, and you will write an argumentative essay that answers the prompt (the prompt is on the next slide). You will also complete a self-assessment after you write your essay.



Today's Lesson - continued

The following prompt was part of the 2018 AP exam and can be accessed on the College Board's website.

"In her book Gift from the Sea, author and aviator Anne Morrow Lindberg (1906-2001) writes, "We tend not to choose the unknown which might be a shock or disappointment or simply a little difficult to cope with. And yet it is the unknown with all its disappointments and surprises that is the most enriching."

Consider the value Lindberg places on choosing the unknown. Then write an essay in which you develop your own position on the value of exploring the unknown. Use appropriate, specific evidence to illustrate and develop your position."



Practice

Double-check your work

Does your introduction...

- Introduce the topic?
- Include a clear and concise claim?

Be sure your body paragraphs include each point listed below.

- ☐ Topic sentence
- Specific evidence
- □ Some context for your evidence (information/background so your evidence can be fully understood)
- **Explanations** *why* your evidence is important, *how* it relates to and supports your claim
- A possible objection and counterclaim (in one paragraph)
- □ Transitions
