Practice Example Sample 1

The color- coding on these next two slides shows you what part of each sentence was modified and its new wording. Your answers may vary from these examplesand that's okay.

Original: Toni Morrison's use of **diction** in Recitatif **explains** how **confusing life** was for Twyla and Roberta **growing up**.

Revised: Toni Morrison's use of **mixed metaphor illustrates** the socially complicated childhood Twyla and Roberta survived.

Practice Example Sample 2

Original: In "We Real Cool", Gwendolyn Brooks' **structure** and **diction does a good job** of making the writing entertaining for readers.

<u>Revised</u>: In "We Real Cool", Gwendolyn Brooks' use of **enjambment** and **allusion invites** the readers into this "cool" life.

 By simply naming one of the structures being used, and one of the types of diction, and changing the verb from a form of "to do" to a more specific verb- you get a more detailed, specific, and focused statement.

Practice #2

<u>Directions:</u> Using the strategy you just learned and practiced, revise one of your sentences from the piece of writing you chose to work with today.

Remember you never want to just say: "the author used diction, structure and tone." Of course they did- they are authors your job is to tell us <u>what kind</u>.

Checklist

Use the following checklist to make sure your thesis is specific.

- 1. You have a **specific verb** Ex: compares, reveals, illustrates...
 - _2. You list the **specific elements** Ex: **metaphor**, **imagery**, rhyme, allusion...
 - _3. Add a **modifier** to your elements for more specificity Ex: <u>extended</u> metaphor, <u>light vs dark</u> imagery, <u>slant</u> rhyme, <u>pop culture</u> allusion
