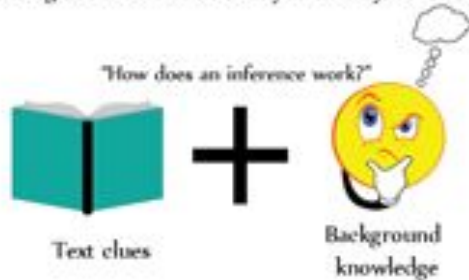
Remember, an *inference* is an educated guess about something or someone using clues and prior knowledge.

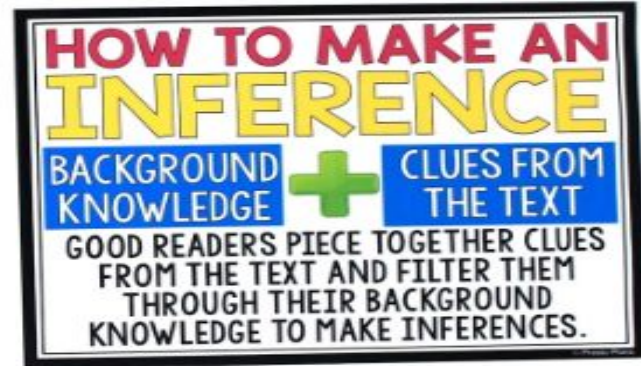
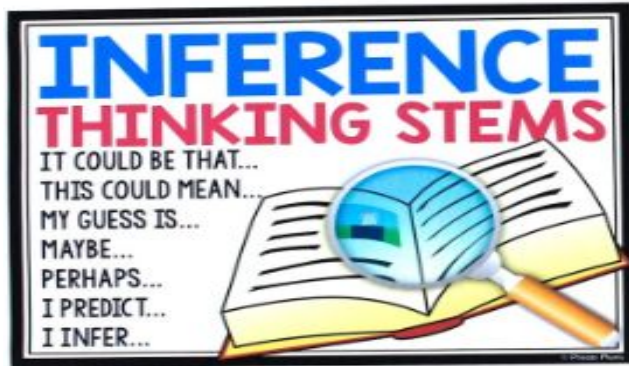
