Capitalization: First Words and I

The first word of a sentence or a line of poetry should be capitalized. The pronoun I should also be capitalized.

Example: That is the first thing I do when I wake up in the morning.

Salutations and closings in letters and e-mails should also be capitalized.

Example: Dear Zahara, Sincerely

Proper nouns and their abbreviations should always be capitalized.

This includes names of people and names of pets.

Titles of people should be capitalized in certain situations.

Examples: Governor Randolph, President Bush, Aunt Hilda, Mom

Titles can be confusing because they are not always capitalized.

Examples: the governor, my aunt, your mom

Periods are used at the ends of sentences. Periods are also used at the end of abbreviations.

Examples: Mrs., Dr., Ulysses S. Grant, A.M., P.M., Ave., Rd., Inc.

clauses are joined by a conjunction (for, and, nor, but, or, yet, so [fanboys]). Example: My family went to Florida, and Sayeed's family went to California.

The king and all he accomplished, all he stood for, has been forgotten. Perhaps he could have done more while he lived that might've helped towards the preservation of his statue. As a leader, there are responsibilities one has to the people. The speaker describes part of the decayed structure as, "a shattered visage lies, whose frown, And wrinkled lip, and sneer of cold command" which conveys a grumpy, unfair, even tyrannical leader.
