






### Learn

When reading a passage of text, the main idea and theme can often be confused. Watch the <u>video</u> to learn more about differentiating between the main idea and theme of a story.





### Learn

#### Main Idea vs. Theme Notes

- Main Idea: Can also be called central idea.
  - What the story, article, or paragraph is mostly about.
  - Authors won't explicitly tell us the main idea. We have to make inferences, or educated guesses, about what the main idea is for each text.
  - Main ideas are always specific to the text. (Ex: The Lion King's main idea A young lion cub grows up to defeat his evil uncle and reclaim the kingdom.)
  - All of the details within the text should support the main idea.

#### Theme

- The life lesson or moral that the author wants to tell the reader.
- Theme is also supported by the details within the text.
- Like main idea, authors won't tell us what the theme of a novel or story is. We have to make inferences, using supporting details as clues.
- Theme is much bigger than main idea.
- Themes are always general. (Ex: The Lion King's theme: What's done deceitfully will always be discovered.)

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#### **Example**




# **Practice Answer Key**
