What Is Summary?

- A summary is a shortened passage, which retains the essential information of the original. It is a fairly brief restatement --- in your own words --- of the contents of a passage.
- Note: You simply report back what the writer has said, without making value judgements.



Learn

Creating a summary for an informational text is different from creating a summary for a literary text because informational texts do not need to be a story with characters. Therefore, you **might not** be able to follow the steps: Somebody, Wanted, But, So, Then.

To summarize an informational text you will need to find the topic, main idea, and supporting details.

To find supporting details look for the answers to these questions: Who? What? Where? When? Why? How?





Be sure to include the following in your summary:

WHO?	WHAT?	WHERE?
(subject)	(action)	(location)
WHEN?	WHY?	HOW?
(time)	(reason)	(process)

What makes a good summary?

- Include the important ideas from the text
- Put ideas in your own words
- Leave out little details and repeated information

WHAT A CROC!

Elvis, the crotchety crocodile didn't like lawn mowers, so he stole one right out of the hands of a worker—while the mower was still running.

The huge 16-foot-long, 1100-pound saltwater croc lives at the Australian Reptile Park in New South Wales, Australia, and has a reputation for being cranky. He doesn't like anyone near him and he doesn't like noise. The 50-year-old reptile made that clear in 2012 when keeper Billy Collett entered Elvis's enclosure and began mowing the grass around the croc's lagoon.

Angry by the disruption, the ill-tempered crocodile charged out of the water and lunged at the mower—never mind that it was still running. He chomped on the front of the machine and engaged in a tug-of-war with Collett. It wasn't much of a contest. Within seconds, Elvis had yanked the machine out of the keeper's hands.

Tim Faulkner, operations manager at the reptile park, heard Collett yell when the crocodile stole his lawn mower. "Elvis got his jaws around the top of the mower and picked it up," Faulkner told the BBC. "Before we knew it, the croc had the mower above his head and then took it underwater with him."

When Elvis dragged the mower into the lagoon, the machine ran for a few seconds before it drowned. He then rested under the water and watched his submerged catch for more than an hour. "Once he got it, he just sat there and guarded it," said Faulkner. "It was his prized, his trophy. If it moved, then he would attack it again."

While the keeper lured Elvis to the other end of the lagoon with kangaroo meat, Faulkner jumped into the water and retrieved the badly chewed-up mower along with two teeth that Elvis had lost during the commission of his crime. "He has extraordinarily large teeth, much bigger than most crocodiles," Faulkner said. "He punched his teeth through the top casing of the mower."

The lawn mower had cut its last blade of grass. It couldn't be fixed.

The manager said that Elvis is "a big territorial male" and one of the largest crocodiles in New South Wales. The reptile has always been crabby troublemaker. Before he was captured in the wild, he was attacking fishing boats in Darwin harbor.

Sentence two tells the results: HOW, WHERE, WHY Elvis chomped through the mower and lost two teeth, because he doesn't like lawn mowers and it disturbed Elvis in Australia Reptile Park.
