Essential Literacy Lesson: April 9, 2020

Learning Target(s) Students will:

• Students will learn how to recognize and identify the sequence of events in written text

Warm Up:

Leaving a blank space from yesterday's work on your work log paper, write today's date (4-9-20). Read a minimum of 5 pages or one chapter from your personal book. Think about the order that things have taken place so far from your reading. On your paper, number your paper from 1-5.

Example:

- 1. 2.
- 3.
- 4.
- 5.

When you finish reading, choose 5 important things that happened in your reading from today or what you have read so far. Did you put them in the correct order?

Learn:

When we put things in order, we are identifying a <u>sequence</u> of events. Sequencing means arranging things in a specific order. Think about making a peanut butter and jelly sandwich. Would the first part of the directions include cutting the sandwich into two triangles? Or would it more likely include gathering the supplies needed to make the sandwich? Sequencing events in the correct order is important because it can be confusing if you explain the ending to a movie without first telling what happened to get there. Think of the plot diagram from yesterday. Would it have made sense to start at the conclusion?

Learn:

One easy way to summarize almost anything, is to use a plot diagram (or story map). That could look like this:




Practice:

Let's use the Plot Diagram to summarize this scene from Disney's

Alice in Wonderland

Practice:

On your paper, draw the plot diagram as best as you can. Fill out the events from the short video.



Practice

Your plot diagram should look something like the one below:

Climax

After talking to a door knob that is the way out of the room, she drinks a potion that shrinks her to the right size to fit. The door knob then tells her that he is locked and a key appears on a table that is now too tall for Alice to reach.

Rising Action

Alice goes through a series of doors until she has to craw through a tiny passage leading to a new room.

Exposition

A box appears with cookies that make her gigantic and she begins to cry, causing the room to flood.

Falling Action

Resolution

Practice:

Let's put all of the information from the plot diagram together to make a complete summary:
