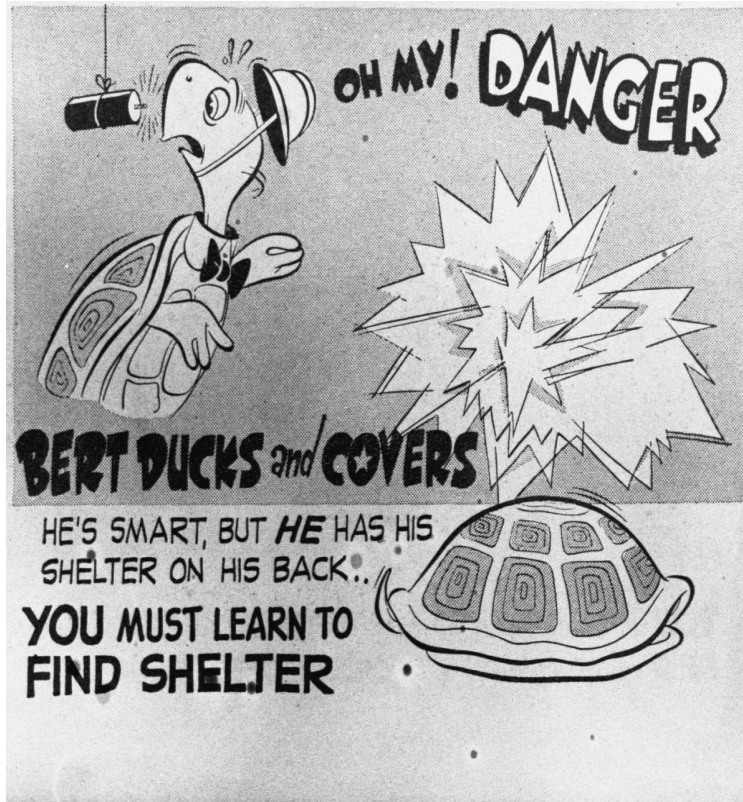

2. Who were the people that school children should find information about on what to do in case an attack happened?

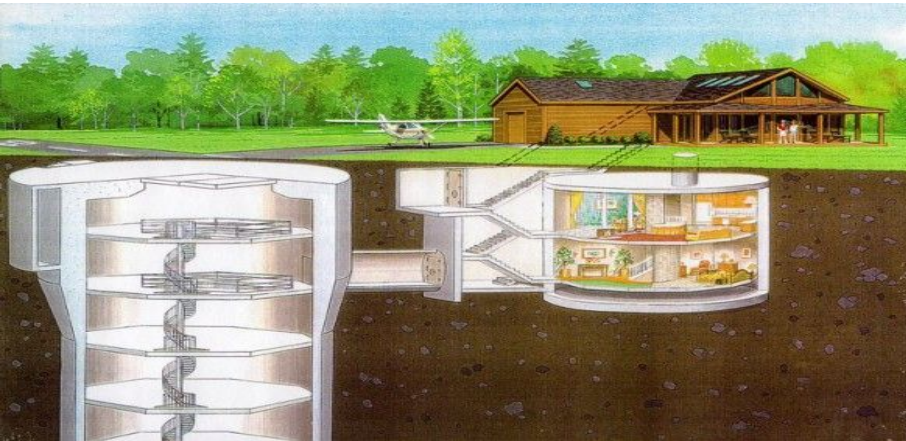
School teachers and really any older adult.
