Lesson 4: May 5: China

Objective/Learning Target: Students will be able to identify different ways in which China's government is an authoritarian regime.

Warm Up

China's official name is the People's Republic of China. However, many scholars around the world agree that China is not a republic. A republic is a representative democracy where people have the power to decide what their country looks and acts like, but this is definitely not the case in China. China is run by the Chinese Communist Party; this party exercises virtually complete control over the whole country.

Today we will look at how China is really more of an **authoritarian** regime. For your warm up, answer the following review questions:

- 1. What does it mean for a government to be authoritarian?
- 2. How much freedom do people usually have in an authoritarian system?
