
APUSH: Lesson #2: April 7th

THE REGIONS OF THE BRITISH COLONIES


Learning Target:




WARM UP

REGIONS OF ENGLISH COLONIES-SOME BACKGROUND

-Remember the English moved to the New World in large numbers, and unlike other settlers, they brought their entire family to the New World. They also tried to isolate themselves from the Natives they came into contact it.

-Motivations for English Settlement:

- 1. Acquire Wealth
- 2. Achieve Power and Glory for Britain
- 3. Convert Natives to Christianity
- 4. Flee Religious Persecutions
