


Warm Up

Note: Respondents who did not give an answer not shown. Source: Survey of U.S. adults conducted March 10-16, 2020.


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Wrap Up Answers

- Cable TV (CNN/FOX NEWS/MSNBC) is leading U.S. Adults to receive news on coronavirus, followed by National TV (NBC/ABC/CBS).
- Are adults not trusting social media anymore due of "fake news?" Do they not care as much? Remember, first reports on coronavirus lead many to believe younger generations would not be harmed.


