## Basic Photo <br> "Looking Closer" <br> Critique

Grades 9-12

May 11th, 2020

Objective/Learning Target:
The student will increase his/her visual literacy by analyzing specific aspects of a provided photo.

## Bell Ringer

What specifically is your favorite subject to photograph out in nature? Why is this? What are you trying to capture in your nature photos? Meaning, what additional content are you wanting to show in your photos? Natural (non-man-made) beauty? Organic life? Growth? Decay? Aftermath? What angles and other compositional devices do you commonly use in those photos?

## Lesson/Activity

Because there cannot be an expectation that all students collect and edit photos, this lesson gives students the opportunity to look at and analyze pieces that could have been presented in classes at school.

IF you have access to a digital camera (or even phone camera) at home, hopefully the examples shown in the lessons will be a source of inspiration for your own work.

## Reflection/Evaluation/Check for Understanding: <br> Composition

1. What objects and/or imagery are you seeing in the work?
2. Is there a main subject or focal point?
3. What are you seeing in the background or negative space areas?
4. What balance are you seeing in the work?
5. What compositional concepts are you seeing? Is one more dominant than others?
6. What type of depth of field is seen?

## Color \& Value Contrast

1. What colors are you seeing?
2. Do these colors help create a specific color scheme? If so, which one?
3. Describe the overall color intensity. Is it saturated, dull, or a combination of both?
4. If the image is black and white, how has the photographer used value/contrast in the image?
5. Is the image primarily light, dark, or a combination?

## Content

1. What do you think is the intended content (message) of the photo?
2. How does the focal point (main subject) relate to the content?
3. How does the arrangement (including size) of objects/imagery relate to the content?
4. What else is happening in the composition that you think adds to the content?
5. Is the color scheme important to conveying the content? Why or why not?
6. How does the saturation (or de-saturation) of the colors relate to the content?
7. How does the perspective (both angle and cropping) affect the content?

## Reflection

1. How would you describe the overall mood, vibe, and energy of the photo?
2. In what ways do you feel the image is successful?
3. Overall, do you like or dislike the photo? Please explain why.
4. What, if anything, could you incorporate from this photo into your own work?
