Objective/Learning Target:
Begin this project by taking photographs that show evidence of "Seeing"-this project will take several days.

Photograph 4+images where there is strong evidence of "Seeing"; through decisive moments a photo that questions the viewer of what might be going on and one from a small animal or toddler point of view. You may use a camera or cell phone camera, natural or artificial light and lenses as needed to submit best possible examples.

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**Objective**: Photograph 4+images where there is strong evidence of "Seeing"; through decisive moments, a photo that questions the viewer of what might be going on and one from a small animal or toddler point of view.
