# Misinformation

- Misinformation is any inaccurate information spread without the intention of misleading.
- Misinformation can be dangerous depending on what the information is, however the intention of the information is not to misinform.

# Why it exists

- Misinformation is much more widespread due to the internet. Within seconds anyone can have access to billions of possible viewers.
- The gatekeepers such as editors who used to exist for mass media no longer exist for many people, so mistakes and bad information more easily get distributed to the populous in general.





# Disinformation

- Disinformation is the intentional spread of information that is false with the hopes that it will either be believed or cause people to question more trusted information.

# Why it exists

- The main purpose behind most disinformation is for a controlling government to keep its populous confused and therefore easy to control.
- We also see disinformation from foreign governments used as attacks to try and keep opposing societies confused and more fragile to manipulation.
