1. What do you think is the biggest difference between interviewing someone in person and interviewing them online or through text?








The Set-Up

Unlike many interviews that we perform during a normal school day remote interviews require a bit more work during the set-up phase.









Platform Options



Zoom

Quick and easy. Most people have become familiar with this.



Google Hangouts

Might be the easiest with another student as you can use your emails.



FaceTime/Skype

Both are great options if you are planning on doing the interview with your phone.





Preparation

Prep work is always important for interviews as you guys are well aware. But when you're interviewing remotely the prepwork is even more important.













Conversation

The best interviews are always more like conversations than a list of questions. This is easier to achieve in person. But, there's plenty of things we can do to make the remote interview work in a similar fashion.

Components for Good Conversation Remotely

Pay attention to what they are saying, so that you can ask great follow-up questions that lead to better answers.

Active Listening

If you are doing a remote video interview make sure you pay attention to their background and ask questions about it.

Observation

Put them at ease. The small talk before the interview is even more critical remotely. That helps build rapport for the actual interview.
