Objective/Learning Target: Students will examine the judicial branch's response to the pandemic.

Bell Ringer/Let's Get Started

The COVID-19 pandemic has altered almost all sectors of our lives.

Think for a few minutes about how some businesses or organizations have changed their operations.

Sketch out a list of reforms made to keep things running during this time.

Lesson/Activity

The Supreme Court has the power to interpret the Constitution. Its rulings on cases determine the meaning of laws and acts of Congress and the president. During oral arguments, attorneys for each side of a case present their positions to the Court and respond to questions from the Justices. Prior to the oral arguments, each side submits a legal brief which are reviewed by the Justices so they have complete understanding of the facts of the case and the positions of each party.

During "normal" times, visitors from all over the world are welcomed; take a look at this line.

Lesson/Activity
