9-12/Legal Communications I & II Lesson: [April 16th, 2020]

Objective/Learning Target: Students will explore areas of criminal procedure.

Bell Ringer/Let's Get Started

Take five minutes or so to write a description of the last encounter you had with police in your area. If you have never had interaction with police, write about an experience of a friend or relative, or one that you have watched or read about in the media.

Do you think most experiences students your age are like the one you shared? Do you think others have encounters that were dramatically different? Based on your thinking, development of a statement that generally describes policing practices in your area.

Today we are going to begin an examination of Community Oriented Policing. This is also known as Community Policing.

After watching the <u>video</u>,make a quick list of your initial thoughts/feelings/ideas.

Community Policing is a controversial topic.

Before we dive deeper, let's think about language. Words and phrases can be defined in two ways. Denotation describes the way a word is defined in the dictionary. Connotation refers to the ideas or feelings that words invoke.

EXAMPLE:

DENOTATION: Blue - a color

CONNOTATION: She's feeling **blue**. Blue = sick or sad

What else? What about Blue Lives Matter?

As you watch this <u>clip from PBS</u>, record words and phrases that stand out to you.

With your list of words, record your connotation.

We will do the same procedure as before for these two videos.
