Bell Ringer/Let's Get Started

Lesson/Activity

Today let's begin to think about how you will collect evidence to prove that your problem is a good issue to reform. This is what you will begin to collect and organize:

- · Interviews with concerned residents, students, parents, school staff, other community members
- Surveys of concerned residents, students, parents, school staff, other community members
- · Articles / stories from local newspapers, newsletters or other news media
- Articles that support a similar issue in other places
- Maps that show how your issue is a problem
- Other data collection (e.g., counting cars or bicycles, etc.) to support your argument

Lesson/Activity

Research List - Create a checklist

- 1. Are there any public policies or law already in place?
- 2. Are there community or advocacy groups working to solve this problem?
- 3. Are local sources?
- 4. Can you locate statistics, charts, graphs, tables?
- 5. Did you find evidence that some might not think this is a problem?

Practice

Using the checklist that you have created, complete some initial research. Then, re-evaluate the problem.

Use these questions for reflection

- 1. Does the government have a responsibility to deal with issue?
- 2. Is this problem important to our community?
- 3. Is there enough information about this topic?
- 4. Is this a topic that has a possible solution?
