Objective/Learning Target:

I can say two-digit numbers in German.



Bellwork: Warm-up - Say the following numbers in German!

10 20 30 40 50 60 70 80 90



How did you do? Did you remember them all?

10 20 30 40 50 60 70 80 90 zehn zwanzig dreißig vierzig fünfzig sechzig siebzig achtzig neunzig



Now that you have learned the numbers 1-9 and the multiples of 10, let's put them together to say 2-digit numbers.

Let's look at the number 42. Forty-two

In German: zwei<mark>undvierzig</mark> or literally two and forty.



131

Let's see that again Let's look at the number 21. twenty-one

In German: einundzwanzig or literally one and twenty.

Let's look at the number 33. Thirty-three

1.523

In German: dreiunddreißig or literally three and thirty.

Notice that the ones and tens digits are swapped between the langauges. This is the case for all numbers with a ones and tens digits.
