**I can say two-digit numbers in German.**

Now that you have learned the numbers 1-9 and the multiples of 10, let's put them together to say 2-digit numbers.

Let's look at the number 42. Forty-two

In German: zweiundvierzig or literally two and forty.

## Let's see that again

Let's look at the number **21**. **twenty-one**

In German: **einundzwanzig** or literally **one and twenty**.

Let's look at the number **33**. **Thirty-three**

In German: **dreiunddreißig** or literally **three and thirty**.

Notice that the **ones** and **tens** digits are swapped between the languages. This is the case for all numbers with a **ones** and **tens** digits.

154,6**31**
