- 1. The Nightingale Pledge is a statement of the ethics and principles of the nursing profession in the United States
- 2. Answers will vary but all require an explanation.
- 3. Most do but it is not mandatory.
- 4. The Hippocratic Oath is a pledge to abide by a code of morals and ethics when providing healthcare.
- 5. They are both pledges of ethics.
- 6. Both are promises, but an Oath is more serious, in that it is usually made to (or in the presence of) a deity or higher power. Example: you pledge money to a charity but you swear an oath in court.



More Practice:

- 1. What happens when a doctor violates the Hippocratic Oath?
- 2. What is the difference between malpractice and negligence?



Answers for More Practice:

- 1. Actually, since it is an ethical/moral issue, nothing happens unless he/she is found guilty of a crime such as malpractice or negligence.
- 2. Malpractice is the improper or unethical conduct or unreasonable lack of skill by a holder of a professional or official position. Negligence is the failure to use such care as a reasonably prudent and careful person would use under similar circumstances. Often negligence leads to malpractice.
