HS Intro to Public Services

Lesson for <u>Tuesday, April 28</u>: Pre-Law Pathway - Civil Trial Attorneys

Learning Target:

Students will understand what a Civil Trial Attorney does, what it takes to become one, and identify the direct impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on the field.



Opening Exercise

Before getting into the lesson, answer the following questions on a sheet of paper:

- 1. Approximately how long does it take for a person to become a lawyer?
- 2. What test do law school graduates have to pass before becoming a lawyer?
- 3. How do Civil Lawyers differ from Criminal Trial Lawyers?



What is Civil Trial Law?

- 1. Civil trial law may include civil litigation (*legal action*), personal injury litigation, and any other type of litigation that is not criminal in nature, such as property disputes, construction or insurance claims and a wide array of other civil controversies.
- 2. Usually money damages are at stake in civil litigation.

- 2. Who files civil cases? PRIVATE PARTIES, NOT THE GOVERNMENT
- 3. Who determines guilt/innocence in a criminal case? JURY
- 4. Who has to pay court costs in a civil trial? PRIVATE PARTIES
- 5. True/False: Juries are rarely used in civil cases? TRUE

- 1. How many years did it take Mr. Stubblefield to get through Law School at the University of Missouri?
 - a. 3 years
- 2. What test did he have to take to become a lawyer after he graduated law school?
 - a. Bar Exam
- 3. In Missouri, how many days does it take to complete that test?
 - a. 2 days
- 4. According to Mr. Stubblefield, approximately how many cases are settled out of court so that it doesn't go to trial?
 - a. 98-99%
- 5. How has COVID-19 affected legal proceedings for Mr. Stubblefield and the courts he works with?
 - a. He isn't able to meet face-to-face with clients and judges, but is still working on things over the phone, video conferences (like Zoom), and if a matter was serious, could still see a judge because technically, the courts are still open, but they are very limited in what cases are being dealt with in person.
