

One point vs. two point perspectives



Let's begin

Three point perspectives are not as common as the other perspective methods discussed and is typically used to illustrate an extreme point of view. The construction of a three point perspective uses a horizon line or line of sight, (represented by the blue horizontal line in the image above) and three vanishing points (the yellow dots). Two points are located on the horizon line to the left and right like a two point perspective and the third is located either above or below the horizon line. The location of the third vanishing point determines whether you are looking up or down at the object being drawn.
