Objective/Learning Target: students will be able to describe ways to have a successful audition

BELL WORK

- Think about the last time you auditioned for something...
 - Solo
 - College
 - Choir
 - Musical
 - Theatre
 - Outside Organizations
- What did you have to do for your audition?
- How did you prepare?
- Did you feel good about it?



PREPARATION

- Being prepared for an audition is definitely the key to be successful
- Typically required for an audition:
 - 2 solo pieces
 - Sight Reading
 - Tonal Memory (sometimes)
 - Range Check
- You will want to be able to tell your accompanist the tempo of each song at your audition
 - Either count or snap it
 - Sing lightly the tempo
 - Practice this!



WHAT MUSIC TO PICK

- Usually, they will want to hear two solo pieces
 - They should be contrasting in style (just like contest)
 - Different time periods, composer, tempo, or language
- The pieces should show your strengths vocally and as a performer
 - Show your vocal range
 - Show your agility
 - Show your musicianship
- You will most likely need to announce your name, pieces and the composers
 - Practice this!
 - Be specific with your word choice so it flows smoothly
 - Correct pronunciation
 - Speak slowly and with good diction so they can understand
 - Depending on the room, project your voice

DRESS/WARM UP

- Dress for success! Make sure your outfit is appropriate and that YOU feel comfortable (can you walk confidently in your shoes,
- The day of the audition, make sure you give yourself plenty of time to get there
- Don't rush and plan ahead!
- Make sure you do a thorough vocal warm up
 - Middle, upper and lower voice
 - Sirens
- Go through your song a couple of times (but don't wear yourself out)
- Memory checks
- Give yourself a good pep-talk! You got this!

FIRST IMPRESSION

- You want to walk into the room confidently!
 - Shoulders back
 - Smiling
 - Standing tall
- Meet the accompanist and tell her the order of the pieces and the tempo for the pieces.
 - Thank them and know that they might be sight reading your pieces.
- When you are ready to begin, go to the front of the piano and announce your pieces
 - Speak slowly and clearly
- After you announce, look down and take a second to breathe slowly.
 - When you bring your head up, your accompanist will know you are ready to begin
 - When you bring your head up, be in character and ready to perform
- Be musical and expressive!

SIGHT READING AND TONAL MEMORY

- Check the key signature
 - Check the time signature
 - What solfege do you start on?
 - Scan the excerpt...
 - Any tricky rhythms?
 - Any big intervals?
 - Any accidentals (flats, sharps, or accidentals)
 - Take a deep breath!
 - Remember to keep going if you mess up
- Tonal memory is used to test your ear
 - The pianist will play a series of pitches and you sing them back
 - Sing on la or doo
