
Lesson: May 12, 2020

Objective/Learning Target: Students will continue to expand their knowledge of scales and the keyboard by adding A and E major scales.

#### Bell Work:

Review and play the following scales using our keyboard app, or your own instrument. <a href="https://virtualpiano.net/">https://virtualpiano.net/</a>

- 1. C Major- C, D, E, F, G, A, B, C
- 2. D Major- D, E, F#, G, A, B, C#, D
- 3. F Major- F, G, A, Bb, C, D, E, F
- 4. G Major- G, A, B, C, D, E, F#, G
- 5. Eb Major- Eb, F, G, Ab, Bb, C, D, Eb
- 6. Bb Major- Bb, C, D, Eb, F, G, A, Bb



### What I Know!



After a few weeks of building scales, you should

- a. Be more familiar with the names of notes on the keyboard.
- b. Be able to spell/play C, D, Eb, F, G, and Bb major scales.
- c. Know the pattern for building major scales. WWHWWWH.
- d. Play simple melodies in C, D, Eb, F, G.
- e. Understand the relationship between singing and playing pitches on the keyboard.
- f. Begin to apply this knowledge to choral music.
- g. Recognize and name all major key signatures correctly.
- h. Know the notes names of the treble clef.

Let's apply what we know to two more major scales. We will begin with E Major.


- 1. How many sharps will we encounter in this scale?

- 5. What are the names of the notes on the staff?








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#### **Practice**

- 4. Can you play the scale on the keyboard?



- 3. Can you spell this scale without help using the pattern WWHWWH?


