Speech/Language Multiple Meaning Words Lesson: May 2020

Learning Target:

Students will determine the correct multiple meaning word for each sentence.

Multiple meaning words or homophones are words with more than one meaning.

For example:

The teacher gave me a **check** mark on my paper. I received a \$100.00 **check** from my aunt in the mail.

Things that might trick you.

*Sometimes the word can have two or more definitions.

Example: I eat grape jam.

Example: I was in a traffic jam.

Example: Be careful not to **jam** your finger in the door.

Multiple Meaning words are words that have more than one meaning.

Noun: A nocturnal flying mammal. Example: I found a bat

in the attic.

Noun: A wooden stick used to hit a ball.Verb: The act of batting.Example: He used the bat to hit the ball in right field.

Multiple Meaning words are words that have more than one meaning.

Verb: To place, put, or leave. Example: I park my car there on Tuesday.

Noun: Land set aside for pleasure of the public. **Example:** I went to the **park**.



Park



Multiple Meaning words are words that have more than one meaning.

Verb: To move back and forth.

Noun: A seat suspended by ropes or chains, on which someone may

sit and swing back and forth. Example: I love swinging in my swing. Verb: The act of swinging. Example: He will swing the bat.





Multiple Meaning words are words that have more than one meaning.

Noun: A fruit boiled with sugar until it is thick.

Example: I had a peanut butter and grape **jam** sandwich for lunch.

Noun: A mass of people crowded together. Example: I was stuck in a traffic jam.



Multiple Meaning words are words that have more than one meaning.

Noun: A thing circle of metal or other material.Example: She wore a ring on her finger.

Verb: To cause a bell to ring. Example: He will ring the bell.








