Cubism


The Cubist movement in painting was developed by Picasso and Braque around 1907-1914, and became a major influence on Western art.





In Cubism the subject matter is broken up, analyzed, and reassembled in an abstracted form. Picasso and Braque followed the advice of Paul Cézanne, who in 1904 said artists should treat nature "in terms of the cylinder, the sphere and the cone." Can you find those forms in this painting?


Cubist painters were not bound to copying form, texture, color, and space; instead, they presented a new reality in paintings that depicted fragmented objects, whose several sides were seen simultaneously. In other words cubist painters threw out all the "rules" of painting that previous painters set.





Look at this painting titled Violin and Pitcher, by Braque. Notice the different shapes. Geometric for the most part. Is there something recognizable in this painting? The violin towards the bottom. But notice how it isn't complete. Only fragments of the violin, but our minds know what it is.


Cubism influences in Contemporary Art

This is called a photocollage rather than a photomontage, because it is more three-dimensional than a montage tends to be. Hockney reflected extensively on his process of collaging prints taken from a camera as connecting to the Cubist sense of multiple angles and especially of movement. These "multiples" (as he called them) convey a strong sense of movement,
