


Objective/Learning Target: We will be learning about street artists.

How did street art start?



Since its explosion on city walls and subway cars in the 1970s, the increasing popularity of graffiti as an art form has won commercial success for its artists and a regular presence in pop culture and the contemporary art world.



Young people were the key players in shaping the contemporary graffiti movement. The first modern graffiti writer is widely considered to be Cornbread. a high school student from Philadelphia, who in 1967 started tagging city walls to get the attention of a girl. But it was only in the 1980s that galleries began to showcase graffiti as artwork.

Early Graffiti Work

In the early 1970's graffiti was more legible; today, it is much more stylish. After all, they called themselves writers, not artists. They wanted to make a statement. These writers used whatever they could find from shoe polish to industrial markers to spread their tags across the city.



Watch this video of early graffiti writers. CBS Sunday America interviewed Futra, Daze, and Lady Pink. In the late 70's and early 80's they created artwork on buildings. Notice that today they are all still artists and have even worked for Nike!
