

#1-Underpainting-Before we write, how would you define this based on the name and the image?



#1-UnderpaintingMany Artists Create

an underpainting mix of burnt sienna and blues to establish shadows and values. Acrylics are probably the best to use at this stage as they're quick-drying and permanent.





#2-Blocking in

You have done maybe without knowing it was a specific technique! Blocking in is when you paint the general colors and shapes before adding more fine textures and details.









#2-Blocking in When is a time you have done this technique? Have you done this with materials other than paints?







#2-Blocking in Choosing the right brushes is important at this stage. Typically, larger round or flat brushes are best and the smaller brushes are saved for details.





#3-Building up textures

Have a dry, flat brush that you can use

to blend your paint. Almost anything can

be used to add texture to your paint.

There are ready made texture media

available, but I have seen items such as

egg shell and sand used to add interest to

a painting. Some artists simply build up

their gesso or underpainting.






#3-Building up textures

One tip is to use an old toothbrush to splatter your image with paint. This can be remarkably effective at suggesting noise and grain.





#3-Building up textures



We are going to stop on this one today because it is quite fun! Watch this video of an artist painting with a toothbrush. Is there anything new around you you can paint with? A cue tip, a stick, a toothbrush? If you have the materials give it a go!




Terms used


