





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Objective/ Learning Target

I can study Artist Maurice Sendak and use the 4 steps of Art Criticism.






Today we are going to look at the illustrations of Maurice Sendak from Where the Wild Things Are written in 1963. Sendak also wrote the book and based it off his Childhood in Brooklyn, NY. Today it is a well known Children's story and they even made a movie!



Have you ever created something that was not accepted? Maybe it was not considered school appropriate or it could have offended someone? This happened to Maurice Sendak! Where the Wild Things Are went through quite the journey to become the loved story it is today. Any idea why?




1960s It took 4 years for the Editors to even publish the book! Talk about Persistence. Can you imagine it taking 4 years for your teacher to accept your art or story? The editors were afraid rebellion, fear, and escape were too much for children.



2. The story was a hit with kids but many adults and psychologists (1960s) found the story too dark. Many libraries and schools took it off the shelves.

3. Sendak himself said that his work is "about human emotion and life" and does not really consider himself a children's Author.

Today, the book lists on Teachers top 100 books by the National Education Association! What a change!



We are going to act as editors today and take Sendak's Wild Things Book cover through the 4 steps of art criticism to decide if we accept his work and are willing to publish it as the cover.

WHERE THE WILD THINGS ARE



1. DESCRIBE

(type of art Real/Abstract, Portrait, landscape, seascape, still life,)

2. ANALYZE

(Elements & Principles of Art- Line, shape, form, color, space, value)

3.INTERPRET

(The purpose or meaning of the art)

4. EVALUATE- (judgment)

Describe

What type of Art is this? What is happening in this scene? Describe this to me as if I am not looking at it.

WHERE THE WILD THINGS ARE



Analyze

Use the Art Elements and Principles to discuss this work. How does the line work affect the art? What color scheme do you notice and does this give the art a certain feel? This is often how you hear your art teacher discuss your work with you.

Line, shape, color, form, value, texture, space balance, rhythm, unity, pattern, contrast, emphasis, proportion, harmony.

WHERE THE WILD THINGS ARE



Interpret

As we learned with Van Gogh and his brother Theo, knowing about the artist themselves often gives us some key to interpreting their artwork. Knowing what we know about Sendak and this story, how would you interpret this scene? Why do you think he has he chosen the character, posture, items, and colors he chose? What is he saying in this?

WHERE THE WILD THINGS ARE



Evaluate-Judge-Decide

You are the critic. What do you think of this work? Is it a good choice for the cover? Does it represent the story well? Do you agree with editors of Sendak's time that it is too dark for children? Finally, Give Sendak two Glows (positive comments) and one Grow (something he could change or work on).
