 Learning Target: What is the purpose of contrast in art?

How do artist create and use contrast in their works?

What role does contrast play in optical illusions? You will need the 2 designs you made this week and the full sized paper from Monday.





First you need to use the full sized paper to create the base for your agamograph.

This is the video which shows a 3 image agamograph if you choose to do that challenge. https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=eKmqDCXY14c&feature=youtu.be You will need to mark all three papers and ;later cut your 2 finished designs.

The video uses 1 inch increments, but if your paper size can't be evenly divided into 1 inch pieces you will need to adjust your measurements.

*Be sure to use a measurement that will EVENLY divide your paper.. if 1 inch doesn't make even sections use a measurement that does.

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Mark every inch* across the top of the paper



Now mark every inch across the bottom



Now use the ruler to connect the marks with straight lines.

Marking your large agamograph paper

- 1. Mark 1,1,2,2,3,3,4,4,5,5,6,6
- 2. Mark A, B, A, B, A, B, A, etc...

	1A	1B	2A	2B	3A	3B	4A	4B	5A	5B	6A	6B	
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The total number of sections depends on your paper size.

Example works are 9x6 so there are 6 sections on each work.

BE, JE, DE, CG, NE, CE, ZE, TE, OE, ST, DT, LI, DT, ST, NT, ST, ST, ST

Now mark the top and bottom of each of your contrast works.



Number each section on your contrast works from 6-1 going left to right.



Label 1 6 5 4 3 2 1 work with Α and the other work with



Carefully cut along the lines to make strips out of your works.



It's a good idea to layout the pieces in the correct spaces before you start gluing.



If using glue stick get plenty of glue on and then hold the strip in place for several seconds to make it grab.



Be sure the strip is lined up well with the line on the background paper.



Once you have all the strips glued down, it's a good idea to put a piece of paper over the top and set some books on it to finish drying flat.



Fold your agamograph into an accordian.. Start with the strip on the end and fold it toward the rest of the work.



Fold your agamograph into an accordian... Flip the paper over and fold the second strip back so you can see the line.



Continue folding each section until you have an accordion or zig zag folded paper.



Your agamograph can stand on a surface as a sculpture or you can glue it to a larger piece of paper to hang on a wall.

If you are gluing it to larger paper/poster board, just remember to leave the accordion folds in the piece and not glue it flat.
