Original Oratory (OO) Writing Process

Pick a Topic

Chose a persuasive topic using the suggestions and guided questions on our "Topic Selection" page.

TODAY'S FOCUS: Research Topic

Look for stories and statistics that help prove your point. Stories, stories, stories. Examples, examples, examples.

Write Outline

Organize your thoughts using our Five Pyramid Method (Introduction, 1st Main Point, 2nd Main Point, 3rd Main Point, Solution)

Write Rough Draft

Start with the first main point, then 2nd, then 3rd. Save the intro and conclusion for last.

Revise Final Draft

Have your teacher, another adult, or a peer look over your rough draft. Make any suggested revisions to develop your final draft.
