# Catastrophe # 37 Starts here:

TWENTY-SEVEN: They're trying to look like a rock star, but they actually look like a manky old pirate. Boys, you may think this is hot, but, take it from me, it's not.

ALL THE BOYS take off their wigs and mustaches and walk away dejected. TWENTY-EIGHT steps forward.

TWENTY-EIGHT: Catastrophe number twenty-eight: The Lovey-Dovey hall.

EVERYONE: Aaaargh! I hate the Lovey-Dovey hall!

TWENTY-EIGHT: This is the most uncomfortable place in the school. It's a hallway down at the other end where one of the overhead lights is broken. It's also one of the skinnier hallways, so naturally, it's more crowded and busy. Once I got tackled three times just trying to get to the restroom.

SEVENTEEN: Tackled? What do you mean?

TWENTY-EIGHT: There're like five or six couples in the school that are so "in love" that they must meet in this hallway between every class and "declare their love." MIDDLE SCHOOL

SEVENTEEN: Oh, right. I know what you're talking about. In fact, here they come now.

EIGHT and NINE start from opposite ends and run toward each other in SLOW MOTION with arms stretched out.

SEVENTEEN: So, you were on your way to the bathroom?

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TWENTY-EIGHT: (Walking down the hall in slow motion.) Exactly! So here I go, just minding my own business, trying to get to the restroom, when bam! Outta nowhere, I'm tackled!

SEVENTEEN: You got in the way of their embrace.

THIRTEEN and FIFTEEN reach TWENTY-EIGHT and collide with him/her in slow motion. They both fall down while TWENTY-EIGHT keeps going. Meanwhile, SIX and SEVEN have started running at each other in slow motion.

SEVENTEEN: You're lucky to be alive!

TWENTY-EIGHT: I use a spin move to get away! But then, I'm attacked by another couple. I tried to dodge them, but their love was just too strong!

SIX and SEVEN sandwich TWENTY-EIGHT in an awkward hug.

SIX and SEVEN: This is awkward.

TWENTY-EIGHT: Yes, that's my whole point.

In slow motion, TWENTY-EIGHT breaks free, sending SIX and SEVEN flying to the ground.

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SEVENTEEN: I hate the Lovey-Dovey hall.

TWENTY-EIGHT: Tell me about it.

THEY ALL fade back as TWENTY-NINE steps forward.

TWENTY-NINE: You guys, we're almost there!

THIRTY: I can't believe you made it this far! But it's not over yet!

TWENTY-NINE: Catastrophe number twenty-nine: Embarrassing moments. While you can't call every moment in middle school an embarrassing moment, I think you can say, with certainty, that, in middle school, everyone has had an embarrassing moment. For many, middle school provided their first embarrassing moment. Go ahead, think back, when was the first time you were truly and utterly mortified with embarrassment. Chances are, it was in middle school. So, to honor your embarrassing and awkward moments, here are your middle school memories:

EVERYONE, in rapid succession, steps up and announces a memory.

ONE: Remember when your phone rang in class revealing your My
Little Pony ringtone?

FIFTEEN: Remember giving an oral report and your voice wouldn't stop cracking?

SIXTEEN: Remember the bathrooms? I'd rather hold it all day than go here.

SEVENTEEN: Remember tripping and accidentally grabbing the fire alarm and from then on everyone called you "Alarmy?"

EIGHTEEN: Remember being upset when your teacher said that middle schoolers aren't mature enough to chew gum and then sticking your hand in the proof of her claim on the underside of the desk?

NINETEEN: Remember how the rows of desks were so skinny that when a teacher stooped over to help someone in the next row, you would get... nah, you don't wanna remember that.

TWENTY: Remember being the only one in your group working on your group project?

TWENTY-ONE: Remember being accidentally pantsed in flag football?

EVERYONE starts to agree.

THIRTY: I've also learned a lot.

ONE: Come on, it doesn't have to be educational. We just need one more catastrophe.

THIRTY: Hold on, now. I wanna tell you what I learned. They say that this is a time to "find yourself." But you've taught me that self isn't found, it's created. And I have the freedom to create the best self I can be.

FOUR: That's great. Is there any way we can we get to that last catastrophe now?

THIRTY: One more thing: I love you guys.

EVERYONE: Awwww!

TWO: That was so... sappy. Is that how we're going to end this? 29

catastrophes and one corny speech?

THIRTY: Nope. You guys missed the biggest catastrophe plaguing

our school and every other middle school.

THREE: What is it?

THIRTY: Catastrophe number 30: The most horrible catastrophe in

middle school is...

Everyone leans in to listen.

THIRTY: ... The floor is lava!

EVERYONE scrambles to get off the floor as fast as possible. ONE can't find a place and falls to the floor.

ONE: I guess that makes me the hot lava monster. (Getting up.) And there you have it, ladies and gentlemen.

EVERYONE: 30 horrible catastrophes of middle school!

## Self Assessment

SET: A space with several student desks, a bench, or blocks, and a large trash can, all of which can be moved around easily during the production.

#### SOUND EFFECTS

#### PROPS

- ☐ Apple
- □ Toy Car
- Scuba Flippers or Huge shoes.
- □ Perfume spray bottle for each female
- □ Cologne spray bottle for each male
- □ Dodgeballs
- ☐ Crumpled up wads of paper for everyone
- □ Phones or something that can look like a cell phone for everyone
- □ Aluminum Foil
- Head gear (teeth braces made with straps, duct tape, and wire hanger)
- □ Tape Measure

- □ Fake long hair for each male

#### DIRECTORS NOTE

The stage directions are written so that everyone is on stage the entire play. This adds energy and helps the pacing as actors don't have to enter from the wings. All actors can watch each scene carefully and react according to how they feel about what is being shown. Also, if they are not in the current scene, they could sit upstage on the floor or on blocks.

#### COSTUMES

Most of the characters are middle school students so they would just wear normal clothes. Occasionally, someone plays a teacher. They could put on a tie or some other accessory to indicate their authoritative role, however, it is not necessary. There is one scene in which all the boys demonstrate having long hair. Wigs or mop heads or yarn all work. The sillier they look, the better. The scuba flipper scene is lots of fun because no matter who you are, you look ridiculous trying to walk in swim fins. Most likely, you don't have a ton of scuba flippers in your costume room. So, it is suggested that every actor who can come up with a pair of swim fins can be in the scene. Huge clown shoes work just as well.
