Warm Up Activity Answers:

Identifying the note a song is based around and identifying the notes that are automatically sharp/flat

Clefs are used to quickly identify a the letter names on a staff and change based on the range of the notes/instrument




Key Signatures in Practice

Now that you know how to use key signatures, it's time to see them in action. As you just identified in the previous slide, Key Signatures tell you which key a song is in, that is to say what note the key is based on, and which notes are sharp or flat automatically.





Let's do a quick review of reading tablature





What does each line represent?

What does each number represent?

What's the saying we use to remember the string names?



Each line represents a string going from lowest pitch to highest pitch

Each number represents a fret on the fretboard

Eddie Ate Dynamite Good Bye Eddie



Once you have mastered these skills, you are on track for learning how to read music! Understanding how pitches relate to each other in a given segment, as well as how the key signature interacts with the notes in a song. If you feel this is still confusing challenging, keep at it and keep practicing!
