* "A copyright is a legal device that gives the creator of a literary, artistic, musical, or other creative work the sole right to publish and sell that work".

COPYRIGHT BASICS

MUSIC BUSINESS



Public Domain

A piece of music is considered public domain if:

- The *composer* no longer has copyright OR
- The *publisher* no longer has copyright

This usually happens because a work of music becomes public domain 70 years after the composer's death.

In the United States, most works published <u>before</u> 1923 are in the public domain.

Go back to the listening examples. Instead of rearranging flashcards, try to write out the rhythm as you listen to the listening examples. Use blank staff paper or a "rhythm stave" paper to write the rhythm.
