#### What is Title I?

Title I is a federally funded program intended to provide support to all students in meeting State Standards.

### How Does Title I Work?

- Our school district identifies eligible schools and distributes federal dollars to provide services.
- \* Title I schools identify students most in need of educational help.
- Programs are designed to add to regular classroom instruction.
- Programs are also designed to involve parents in supporting student learning.

## Our Title I Schoolwide Program

Our school has a schoolwide Title I program, meaning that all students may benefit from the Title I funded resources. Title I services might include support from a Family School Liaison, Reading Specialists and/or Reading Paraprofessionals, Professional Development for Teachers, After School Tutoring, and Classroom Resources that enhance the educational process in the classroom.

# What Does Support for Students Look Like?

Reading Specialists can offer either in-class or limited pull-out intervention. Children who would best benefit from the effects of the program through large group instruction remain in the classroom during their reading period while working periodically with the Reading Specialist. The Reading Specialist works collaboratively with the regular classroom teacher, planning instruction and support for students. Push-in programs benefit all students since there are two teachers in the classroom to instruct students during reading lessons.

Some students may need more intensive help in order to improve their reading comprehension and foundational reading skills. In these cases, Reading Specialists pull the child from class on a daily or semi-regular basis and offer small group instruction with students at the same reading level.
